**<u>Christmas Holidays</u>**: We break up today for 2 weeks. Enjoy the break and we will see you back in school at 8:45am on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> January.

**Punctuality:** From the start of the Spring term the gates to school will be closed at 8:45am. The side entrance will be for entry only, exit will be via the main gates. Any children entering the school gates after 8:45am will be recorded in our 'late gate' book. They will still be able to go to their classrooms via the outside doors. Any children entering school after 8:50am will have to go through the office and will be recorded as late in the register. The gates are open from 8:30am so please be on the yard on time and ready for the teachers to collect their classes. Early Birds breakfast club is on every morning and is **FREE** from 8:15am. Children must enter the hall by 8:30am to be allowed in the club.

<u>Head lice:</u> We have had a few known cases recently of head lice within school. Parents are therefore asked to be very vigilant by following these procedures.

### LOOKING FOR HEAD LICE OR THEIR EGGS

- Regularly comb and brush hair very thoroughly at least once a day. This will ensure most lice are removed and prevent them from laying further eggs. Live lice will not always be seen but are most easily detected by fine combing wet hair.
- Eggs are laid at the scalp. Look thoroughly here and at the hair nearest the scalp for small white eggs. The distance of the eggs from the scalp will indicate how long ago the infection took place. Evidence is usually found at the nape of the neck or behind the ears. In those with short hair, the eggs are found at the front of the forehead.
- Head lice cannot fly, jump or swim but spread by walking from head to head during close head contact.

# WHAT TO DO IF YOU FIND EVIDENCE OF LICE OR THEIR EGGS

- Do treat an infected child's hair with lotion
- DO NOT send your child to school until you have treated their hair with the recommended lotion described below.
- Only those infected should be treated. Treating uninfected children and adults can result in head lice becoming resistant to a lotion.
- Lotion is available on prescription from your GP. Prescriptions can be obtained through the GP's receptionist if there is a wait to see the doctor. You can also use your Pharmacy First book if you live in the city and go straight to the pharmacy with your book to obtain the lotion over the counter. If none of these are possible you can buy the lotion over the counter at the Pharmacy for a cost of approximately £5 to £8.
- Do get everyone your child may have been in contact with to have their hair checked, including all family members and other relatives, and of course yourselves!
